Julie is originally from the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DRC). War ravaged her country. In 1996, she fled for her life with her family to Kenya while she was eight

months pregnant. Two years later, they moved to Atlanta where they found jobs and were able to send money to family and friends still back in the DRC.

these children must endure. "Most never get to have decent food or play happily. They don't have the opportunity to go to school."
