This session highlights some of the challenges Pikes Peak Habitat's interfaith subcommittee has faced over the years and provides tips on how to address them for other organizations facing similar challenges.

## What Does an Interfaith Dialogue Look Like? A Conversation on Interfaith Collaboration

This module provides a real-life example of a natural, organic interfaith dialogue for viewers to analyze. Reflection space is also provided so participants can analyze the interfaith listening skills utilized by conversation participants and then practice these skills in groups.

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# How to Use This Video Series

## Ideas for Using This Training Series

We are excited that you are interested in learning more about interfaith work! Whether you have been building bridges across lines of faith for decades or are just starting to consider interfaith work in your place of business, faith community, or in another context, we are excited you are pursuing this training. Here are some potential ways to use this series:

- If you are just starting your interfaith journey and are looking to start your own interfaith project, we recommend watching the videos chronologically. After viewing each video, complete the reflection exercises, then take weekly actionable steps to put each session's teachings into practice as you develop your project.
- If you are further along in your interfaith journey, feel free to skip to the videos and lessons that best suit your needs.
- Use this series to train your staff at your business, class, or nonprofit on how to best serve and engage with clients or customers from different faiths.
- Gather a group of five to seven individuals from two different faith traditions and go through this curriculum together for eight weeks to build up your interfaith skills and practice engaging in interfaith dialogue.

## Advice from Our Faith Leaders

What specific, tangible advice would you have for individuals trying to reach out to a faith community for the first time?



### Tips on Attending a Religious Ceremony

"Currently a guest [attending a service] would need to sign up online as a guest for security and can reach out to our office administrator for more information."

"You might check to see if communion is offered to all attendees during the service. You don't have to take communion if you don't want to. Stay seated or let other folks out of the pew and then sit back down." -Member of an Episcopal Church



"If you are going to visit, please adhere to our modest dress. Women are expected to please wear long maxi skirts, jeans, or pants, and long sleeves -- no tank tops, miniskirts, or shorts, or low-cut shirts.

Men can wear pants, jeans, t-shirts, or long sleeves.

Please be respectful of our space when visiting.

We have a space for men and one for women.

Attend our service quietly and keep questions until the end."

### Reaching Out to a Faith-Based Liaison

"I would advise calling the church office during work hours and ask who would coordinate service and/or interfaith activities and how to contact them. This will probably be a pastor or local engagement director." -Retired Lutheran Church Pastor



"Either phone or email work.... Identify yourself, your organization, and reason for contact." -Member of a Jewish Temple

"With Native American communities, it is a good idea to arrange a oneon-one meeting to discuss what is expected or wanted. It would be recommended for some of the group to attend Native American events such as a pow wow." - Member of a Native American Group

#### General Tips for Working with Diverse Communities

Be mindful of the Jewish calendar.
You can add a Google calendar of Jewish holidays to your phone so
you know when the holidays are that year."

"In Judaism, we have this concept called 'Tikkun Olam,' which means 'repairing the world.' We have a legend that when God created the world, the world was this solid ball of pure light and goodness. Then, for whatever reason, God literally drops the ball and it shatters into a million pieces. Every time we do a good deed -- when we help another person -- we help repair the entire world, and we put a little piece of that shattering back together."



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## Getting Started on an Interfaith Project

- What are some of the common issues you see facing members of your community? What issues are currently being unaddressed?
- What role can faith communities play in addressing community needs? What role can businesses play?
- What core human need will your interfaith project work on addressing?
- If you are planning to bring together diverse faith leaders, how can you design your first meeting to be welcoming to people of all faiths and/or no faith?



- Take some time to outline your pitch to faith leaders. How are you asking them or their congregants to participate?
- If you are training staff using this curriculum, how can your organization be more accommodating to people of diverse beliefs? What protocols are currently in place, and what may need to change?

"We use e-mails to our membership and discuss [events] at our monthly meetings [with a sign-up sheet]." -Member of a Native American Association

"I send text messages to my community members."

"Set up a booth for after services to recruit."

"We make announcements, mass broadcast texts, and personal phone calls and texts to individuals."

"I reach out to the missions team, then to the men's group."

"1. Putting [the opportunity] in the weekly and monthly bulletin. 2. Calling people who I think might be interested. 3. Announcing information about Habitat during the information portion after our services."

"I have been making coffee dates with various clergy and inviting them to identify members who may be a good fit and give them contact information." -Liaison for Faith-Based Advocacy Organization



"Hesitation is a really natural human response. We hesitate all the time, whether it's out of fear, out of self-consciousness, which is probably rooted in fear, or just not knowing. Practicing together in a Zen sangha, we dig into hesitation.... Hesitation is actually seen as a common natural thing. Can I experience fear and just see it? Oh, this is fear. And then do what is called for and not become identified by those feelings, [and] not become locked up and unable to help."

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# What Challenges Have You Faced Pursuing Interfaith Work?

- If you have started your project, what specific challenges are you facing?
   Brainstorm some ways to address these challenges.
- If you haven't started your project, what challenges do you imagine might arise when bringing together individuals of diverse beliefs?
- When disagreements arise between individuals of different beliefs, how could you respond?
- How do you typically respond to conflict?



- What might make someone from your particular belief system or place of work hesitant to engage across religious divides? How might you address these concerns?
- How did you see the speakers in the video address hesitation in their own faith communities?



"I think we're going to have to continue balancing the bonding and the bridging. We're going to have to balance how much we're deepening our relationships with the people actively involved and how much we're branching out to, especially, other faith communities and communities of no faith who have not yet joined us, who haven't been introduced to what we're doing, so that [our interfaith work] is not static."
