Dear friends and supporters of Pikes Peak Habitat for Humanity,

What a year it's been!

As the costs of construction materials and land in El Paso County have skyrocketed, you've stepped up to the challenge. Thanks to you, five more workforce families became homeowners through Pikes Peak Habitat — and we look forward to partnering with nine more in the next fiscal year! We also provided repairs for 27 seniors, veterans, and other cost-burdened homeowners who needed upgrades focused on health, safety, and accessibility. Internationally, our tithe (10% of undesignated funds) supported Habitat affiliates in Bangladesh, Cote d'Ivoire, and Uganda, as well as Habitat's International Disasters Fund and Orphans and Vulnerable Groups Fund.

It's also been an exciting year for our faith programs, which are drawing national attention. Habitat for Humanity is joining Catholic Charities USA, Interfaith America, and the YMCA of the USA in the White House's Team Up initiative, a pilot program supporting organizations who build bridges between diverse communities. Thanks to our interfaith efforts — including the three-week Building the Beloved Community initiative and interfaith dialogue— Pikes Peak Habitat was one of 10 affiliates chosen to participate. We'll be creating training videos for other organizations interested in pursuing interfaith work and hosting interfaith dialogues. We also dedicated new Apostles Build and Interfaith Build for Unity homes this year—and are continuing these programs in FY '24!

Helping fund these exciting efforts are our ReStores, which offer cost-effective outlets for donated construction supplies and home goods. Both stores also serve as drop-off donation points for metal, paint, and porcelain recycling, keeping more than 2,500 tons of usable materials out of landfills in FY '23. And we've just expanded into online retail with an e-commerce storefront on eBay! We continue to look for other platforms that will enable us to grow our online presence and broaden our customer base.

We couldn't do any of this without you. All of these accomplishments belong to **you**, because of your dedication, your donations, your word-of-mouth support, and your volunteer time. Every amount, no matter how small, helps us partner with workforce families in need of affordable housing. Every nail pounded, every item priced, every text sent to a legislator makes a difference.



In FY '23 the average cost for a **two-bedroom** rental in El Paso County was **\$1,484**/mo., requiring a salary of **\$59,360** (**\$28.54**/hr). That's **2.1** full-time jobs at minimum wage of **\$13.56**/hr! Affordable rent (**30%** of income) for a full-time worker earning minimum wage is **\$710**/mo. Colorado has the **8th** highest housing costs in the United States.

But if we were to put a sink or toilet into a landfill today, 500 years from now it's still a sink or toilet because it does not biodegrade at all. So by bringing it to us and having it go to [Colorado Springs Utilities program] Commode the Road, they're recycling it into something we use."
